
Question 1: "Do you think the Labour Party should contest elections in Northern Ireland?

Key points:

- 32% of people want us to stand, support from Unionist/Nationalist & Other.
- 'Soft' nationalists, unionists and 'other' all show broadly similar support.
- Amongst the "strong" Nationalists/Unionists there is a bigger split, unsurprisingly with more support from Unionists.
- Overall, the fact we can draw support from across all political traditions is something that we should be exploring in more depth.

The below chart shows support by constitutional stance.




<u>Gender</u>

Response by Gender




Location

• Support is broadly similar across all NI 'regions'




Question 2:"In a NI Assembly, or local government (council) election, would you give Labour Party candidates a first preference, or a 2nd or lower preference vote, or no preference?

Northern Ireland operates on a PR-STV system- this means that the electorate can opt to give a ranked preference to a given candidate. There is no requirement to give every candidate a preference - indeed this question explicitly allowed the respondent to select "No Preference at all" or "Don't Know/Not Sure/No Opinion".

Key Points:


- As should be obvious, Labour achieving 38% support amongst the voting base should be seen as a real appetite for Labour politics in N. Ireland.
- 6% of people said they would give us a first preference! This is huge. For example, PBP get 1.1%, and have a number of councillors and MLA's. Similarly, the Green Party get 1.9% and also had an MLA and some councillors.
- Unlike PBP and the Greens we are very transfer friendly, with 32% of people saying they'd transfer to Labour. NI Tories in contrast pull 0.0% of the vote.



Responses by constitutional Stance

Key Points:

• More unionists than Nationalists think we should stand, but more nationalists than unionists state they would give us a vote. This is potentially linked to Unionists typically being associated with the Conservative Party. Indeed, the DUP/Tory working together in Westminster shows this to be the case.



Response by Constitutional Stance

Selection of "Qualitative" responses.

A small selection of the responses some users provided in the "other" field. There were a number of comments critical of Keir Starmer, Jeremy Corbyn, and Brexit. Reflecting the fact NI is a mature polity that holds people of the same political persuasions as the rest of the UK.

- 1. "The Labour Party should stand candidates. I don't know why the won't. With the cost of living and the DUP working with the tories to create a mess we really need Labour to stand up for working people in Northern Ireland"
- 2. "I would rather vote for a candidate that would take their seat in Westminster."
- 3. "The Labour Party should contest elections here but unattached to any political or religious grouping in Ireland or NI"
- 4. "Keep voting for the same people, keep getting the same horrendous results. Over the 15 years this assembly of fools has delivered nothing but more poverty, pain and deprivation."
- 5. "The labour movement needs to be more coherent in northern Ireland be that a stronger sdlp or an agreed labour movement to represent both traditions."
- 6. "There are more important things like cost of living, hospitals and education that the executive should prioritise"
- 7. "It is the only way forward. Political Parties here are far too politically naive focusing on squabbling with the opposition and contributing nothing to the health and prosperity of the N.I people."
- 8. "We need the same old parties removed from Stormont and replaced by new parties. A change needs to happen if we are to move forward."
- 9. "it is necessary for Labour to offer an alternative."
- 10. "I would love Labour to stand in NI. At 65 years of age I would finally feel that I had a vote that had an impact at Westminster."
- 11. "The sooner the Labour party field candidates in Northern Ireland the better."
- 12. "Labour should stand in N.I. as the SDLP has a one sided view and does not represent both communities."

- 13. "It is about time that Labour stands candidates in Northern Ireland. Long overdue!"
- 14. "People from northern ireland should be allowed to join uk labour. And not continually pushed to the sdlp."
- 15. "Labour party needs to stand as OK labour and not und er the wing of SDLP."
- 16. "I think there is a desire for mainstream politics rather Orange vs Green in NI. Perhaps this explains the surge in support for the Alliance party. It also points to a missed oppertunity for the mainstream parties. Both Labour and Lib Dems should field candidates in N. Ireland. I find their failure to do so somewhat disrespectful"
